CB HE: what is it about?

Programme countries => Member States and associated third countries

Partner countries => Non-associated third countries

International cooperation projects based on multilateral partnerships in the field of higher education

Supporting the relevance, quality, modernization and responsiveness of higher education in third countries not associated to the Programme for socio-economic recovery, growth and prosperity and reacting to recent trends.

Three types of CBHE projects

National projects	Multi-country regional projects	Multi-country cross- regional projects
HEIs from one third country not associated to the programme	HEIs from several countries not associated to the Erasmus+ programme from one region	HEIs from countries not associated to the Erasmus+ programme belonging to several regions

-At least 2 EU Member States or third countries associated to the Erasmus+ Programme. Among them, each participating country must involve at least 1 HEI.

Duration and funding rules per Strand

Strand 1

- Projects can last 24 or 36 months
- Funding between EUR 200.000 and EUR 400.000 per project

Strand 2

Projects can last 24 or 36 months
Funding between EUR 400.000 and EUR 800.000 per project

Strand 3

- Projects can last 36 or 48 months
- Funding between EUR 600.000 and EUR 1.000.000 per project
- Involvement of the Ministry



Strand 1 Fostering access to cooperation in HE

Facilitate access to newcomers

First step for participating organizations to enhance and increase means to reach out to people with fewer opportunities

Reduce the internationalization gap of HEIs from the same country/region

New budget type Lump sum II: approach – basic principles

Applicants must define work packages and a detailed estimation of costs for each work package per beneficiary Evaluator assess cost details during the evaluation and make recommendations if needed. Based on this, the EU grant in the form of lump sum is fixed during grant agreement preparation

Award criteria

Relevance of the project (max 30 points)

Project design and implementation (max 30 points)

Partnership and cooperation (max 20 points)

Sustainability, impact and dissemination

(max 20 points)

The applications may score up to **100 points**. To be considered for funding, proposals must score at least **60 points** in total and at least half of the maximum points for each award criterion. Additional considerations apply to determine priority among equal scoring proposals

Erasmus+ How to submit your CB HE proposal?

Preliminary steps:

- Concrete project idea
- **Start locally** in your institution
- Find the right **partners**
- Consult the Erasmus+ Programme Guide and National Erasmus+ Office

Admissibility:

- Applications must be submitted before the call deadline, electronically through the European Commission's Funding & Tender Opportunities Portal (FTOP)
- Call ID: ERASMUS -EDU-2024-CBHE
- Get more guidance on how FTOP works on the FTOP Online Manual
- Register on the portal for an EU Login Account
- Make sure your organisation has a valid **Participant Identification Code (PIC).** If not, get one via the Participant Register

What is a successful application ? I

It is not just succeeding in being selected, but in delivering the expected results

- \checkmark leading to an effective implementation
- \checkmark producing the expected changes
- \checkmark keeping the results alive after the funding period
- <u>Smooth implementation highly depends on the amount of time</u> invested in the preparation, as at this stage you are able to wipe out many potential obstacles

What is a successful application ? II

- has been prepared and agreed jointly by all consortium partners
- has received the full institutional commitment and support of all consortium partners
- is ready to start immediately after the selection decision
- Clear and ambitious proposals that correspond to the needs of third countries not associated to the Programme and regional priorities
- Results that make a difference on several levels: impact

To be improved

- Confusion between tasks / milestones / indicators / deliverables
- ➤ Weak needs analysis
- Innovation not visible
- ➤ Too high share of Staff Costs
- > No equipment for newcomers
- > In Strand 1, missing or too few newcomers, not well justified

Terminology

- Objectives is what you will achieve in the project period
- Implementation is how you will do your project in the project period
- A task refers to any activity that has a definite outcome associated with it
- Deliverables are the final products/results of your project, those justifying spending public money to fund the project
- A milestone is a significant step in the successful production of a deliverable
- Impact is spreading (dissemination) and use (exploitation) of your results during and after project, including beyond the original consortium
- Communication is everything you do to inform about and get attention to your project during the project period
- Curriculum = Study Programme Degree (Bachelor or Master)
- Course = Subject = Module

Erasmus+ Virtual Exchanges



What are virtual exchanges?

Online people-to-people activities that **promote intercultural dialogue and soft skills development**. They make it possible for every young person to access high-quality international and cross-cultural education (both formal and non-formal) without physical mobility.

They take place in small groups and are always moderated by a trained facilitator.

They should be easily **integrated into youth (non-formal education) projects or higher** education courses.



Specific objectives of this call

- Encouraging **intercultural dialogue** with Partner Countries and **increasing tolerance** through online people-to-people interactions
- Promoting various types of virtual exchanges, allowing more young people to **benefit from intercultural and international experience**
- Enhancing **critical thinking and media literacy**, particularly in the use of internet and social media
- Fostering the **digital and soft skills development** of students, young people and youth workers
- Promoting citizenship and the common values of freedom, tolerance and nondiscrimination through education
- Strengthening the **youth dimension** in the relations of the EU with Partner Countries



Eligibility criteria: what must partnerships look like?

A minimum of 2 higher education institutions from 2 or more different Erasmus+ Programme Countries



Or

A minimum of 2 higher education institutions from 2 or more different Partner Countries *within the same Erasmus+ region*

A minimum of 2 youth organizations from 2 or more different Erasmus+ Programme Countries A minimum of 2 youth organizations from 2 or more different Erasmus+ Partner Countries within the same Erasmus+ region

Note: the number of organisations from Programme Countries may not be higher than the number of organisations from Partner Countries.
